IDENTIFICATION CHECK

- Identification is required from all passengers.
- Passengers refusing to present identification and/or permit checked baggage inspection may be denied transportation.
- All bags and property are subject to search. Non TSA approved locks may be broken in case of search. Xtra Airways is not responsible for broken locks (excluding TSA-approved luggage locks).
- Passengers must control all belongings: do not leave items unattended. Unattended items are subject to search and may be remove and/or destroyed.
- Do not accept items for carriage from any unknown persons.

Federal Rules for Checked Baggage and Passenger Transportation

TRANSPORTATION OF FIREARMS

TSA Regulations require that firearms in checked baggage must be declared, unloaded, and placed in a locked, hard-sided container. Passengers failing to declare firearms or passengers transporting loaded firearms are subject to substantial civil and/or criminal penalties per violation.

UNAUTHORIZED INCENDIARY OR EXPLOSIVE DEVICES

Federal regulations prohibit: Lighters*, Matches*, Certain Flammable Liquids, and loose batteries. *Each passenger may bring one common lighter (Bic, Zippo) and one (1) book of safety matches.

Privacy Notice

(found in Section 1560.103 of the Secure Flight Final Rule)

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) requires you to provide your full name, date of birth, and gender for the purpose of watch list screening, under the authority of 49 U.S.C. section 114, the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004 and 49 C.F.R parts 1540 and 1560. You may also provide your Redress Number, if available.

Failure to provide your full name, date of birth, and gender may result in denial of transport or denial of authority to enter the boarding area.

TSA may share information you provide with law enforcement or intelligence agencies or others under its published system of records notice.

Before you go...

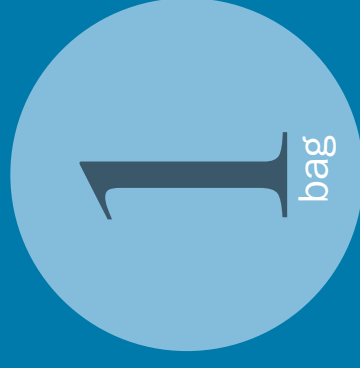
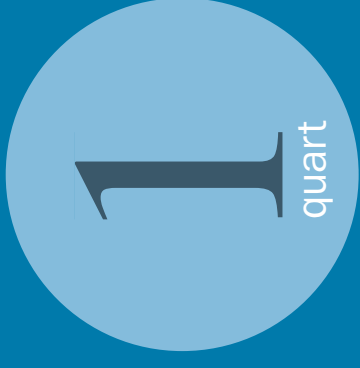
- Visit www.tsa.gov for all the latest security policies
- Pack liquids/gels in your checked baggage. For a short trip you are permitted to carry-on 1 quart-size, clear plastic, zip-top bag holding 3 ounce or smaller containers of liquids or gels. Limited to one bag per traveler.
- Medications and breast milk/baby formula are allowed in reasonable quantities exceeding 3 ounces and are not required to be in a zip-top bag. These items must be declared to a security officer at the checkpoint.
- All footwear must be removed for x-ray screening. Wearing footwear that can be easily removed is helpful.
- Pack valuables such as jewelry, cash and electronics, as well as fragile items, in your carry-on.
- Avoid wearing accessories that contain metal, which will set off the metal detector.
- Put all undeveloped film in your carry-on bag. Checked baggage screening equipment may damage film.
- If carrying a firearm, please check with your airline for appropriate procedures.

When you arrive...

- Take your 3-1-1 bag out of your carry-on and place separately in bin.
- Declare all permitted liquid exceptions to a security officer in front of the checkpoint.
- Take your laptop and video cameras with cassettes out of their cases for screening.
- Remove your footwear and outer coat, suit coat, jacket or blazer to place in the bin for X-ray.
- Place the following items in your carry-on before entering the screening checkpoint: cell phones and personal data assistants, keys, loose change, jewelry and large metal items.

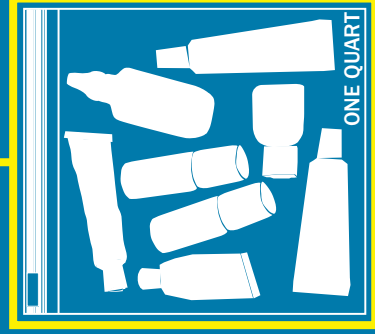

Office of Security & Hazardous Materials

Federal law forbids the carriage of hazardous materials aboard aircraft in your luggage or on your person.

(1) Federal law forbids the carriage of hazardous materials aboard aircraft in your luggage or on your person. A violation can result in five years' imprisonment and penalties of \$250,000 or more (49 U.S.C. 5124). Hazardous materials include explosives, compressed gases, flammable liquids and solids, oxidizers, poisons, corrosives and radioactive materials. Examples: Paints, lighter fluid, fireworks, tear gases, oxygen bottles, and radio-pharmaceuticals.

(2) There are special exceptions for small quantities (up to 70 ounces total) of medicinal and toilet articles carried in your luggage and certain smoking materials carried on your person. For further information contact your airline representative.
